PLAY BETTER BRIDGE!

The more you know, the better you will play – so here are five tips to help:

ONE: Don't play too fast! If as declarer, you prematurely play a card from dummy, your RHO defender has the right to ask partner to play BEFORE he decides what to play. Same rule applies if you lead from dummy and prematurely play from your hand.

TWO: When you describe your partner's bid, disclose as much as you can, not as little. For example, your partner bids 1C. The correct responses are, "4+", if you are playing basic ACOL four card majors, or "Could be as few as 3," if you are playing five-card majors. "Natural", is an insufficient answer.

THREE: You do not have to alert a cue bid as, although it is a conventional call, it is self-alerting.

FOUR: Always alert your partner's opening of 1NT, e.g. 12-14 or 15-17. Apart from being the right thing to do, it's in your best interest. Your explanation removes the chance your opponents will ask a question that may convey valuable information to their partner.

FIVE: These bids are in such common use they are deemed to be self-alerting:

- 2C game force bid, and the following 2D negative response
- Simple Stayman 2C response to a 1NT opening bid, and a 2D response denying a 4-card major.
